Thank you for joining us at our first in-person festival in over two years! We are excited to welcome you back and for some of us, to meet you for the first time (hi, nice to meet you – I'm Alain).

Now a lot has changed at the Ottawa Fringe over the last two years. Besides perfecting our somersaulting from one plan onto the next, from in-person programming to digital and back again, we have welcomed some new faces. And in a short time, these new faces are already bringing an exciting energy to the Fringe and the Ottawa theatre community. We all look forward to getting to know you over the next couple of weeks, during the run of this festival!

This year's undercurrents festival is exciting to us because it is bridging the organization from one team to another and is presenting a number of productions that have been in development over the last few years. Some of these shows have had previously staged iterations while others are premiering this April.

You can see a number of local shows including autobiographical works by emerging Indigenous artist Montana Adams and former news anchor Lucy van Oldenbarneveld, who you might know from CBC News Ottawa; shows with original music by Martin Dawagne in YARNS (think rock concert meets contemporary theatre) and Geoff McBride & Margo MacDonald in The Persistent Stain, playing at Club SAW.

You can catch national offerings with a digital production of Something in the Water: a playful absurdist coming out story from Saskatchewan artist S.E. Grummett and be entertained by the critically hailed all-Filipina Tita Collective from Toronto.

We also have the return of our Discovery Series with a summer camp musical by Fringe favourite Alli Harris and a combination of monologues about being a cashier during a pandemic by Ryan Pepper & Isabela Solis-Lozano.

As you see, there's no shortage of entertainment at this year's undercurrents festival. I encourage you to catch as many as you can – build your own viewing package if you will and enjoy what the newness of spring and the newness of the Fringe have to offer.

The concept was born in Brussels, Belgium and the result is a hybrid between a rock concert and contemporary theatre play; a one-man symphony of multi-layered live looping and distortion, interspersed with original spoken prose.

The songs of Yarns are the musical tracings of a spirit fleeing on itself. Rather than a collection of tracks, it is a succession of sound paintings and meditative prose about escapism and removal. In addition to the paradoxes of relocation – excitement, doubt, guilt, inspiration – Yarns finds its source in the struggle against mental disorders, no matter their form. The pieces performed in the set transform from cinematic/ethereal moments to noisy/distorted epics.

"The Persistent Stain" is a second-wave Canadian punk band that's been slogging it out on the small touring circuit for decades. Now they find themselves in their 50s still pursuing the dreams in their 20s. As they struggle through yet another gig in yet another nowhere town, Joey Blank and Maxie Staines ask themselves: Should they stay, or should they go?

Maxie and Joey are the only ones left alive from the original band; they travel with the ghosts of their former bandmates. "Aristotle's Dick" was their only hit song, and now a younger, hipper band wants to steal it. The pair have to decide if giving up the song also means giving up the dream.

A comedy which also hits hard, asks tough questions, and touches on soft spots—the show includes original songs played live.

This play is about smuggling. This play is about Indigenous sovereignty. This play is about family. This play is about the Mohawks of Akwesasne.

We can focus on the physical and the cultural. How our traditions got tangled in this web of politics and ideologies, which only caused our people to suffer. How we persist and continue. How close and personal the land is to our very livelihood, how people don't understand and how we don't really care if you can't understand. How we say we're not going to coddle you after everything is done. Not after all the patience we've spent already.

Akwesasne is cut into four separate jurisdictions: One district in Ontario, two in Quebec, and one in New York State. To people who are not aware or used to this fact, it's fascinating. It's intricate. It begs more explanation and more questions.

To us it's an inconvenient and, most of the time, dull reality. Until we decide it isn't.

You can just leave it there, or choose to add other elements that will influence the nature of the steel. It then takes on those components and changes into something else, ultimately becoming stronger than the sum of its parts.

As a longtime broadcaster and journalist, Lucy van Oldenbarneveld told other people's stories everyday. Me, Vivien Leigh and the Roller Rink is her story, and it takes place in her hometown of Hamilton, Ontario. It was 1981, the year of the largest strike in Stelco history with a recession hitting the steel industry. This unstable political climate would become the backdrop for her formative years. But everything changed the summer she landed a coveted job at the local roller rink. After reading Margaret Mitchell's award-winning novel Gone With the Wind, 15year old Lucy believed Scarlett O'Hara to be a storm of initiative and toughness. She was the role model she was looking for - or was she? Lucy's humorous and poignant stories that will take audiences on her coming-of-age journey as she is forged in the fires of Steeltown. All while wearing roller skates.


